School No. 5 has been selected to join the prestigious National Blue Ribbon Schools Program, a coveted designation from the U.S. Department of Education that celebrates excellent schools and effective educators.

Faculty and staff were surprised with the good news on Thursday, Sept. 24. School No. 5 was chosen in the “Ex-



emplary High Performing School” category based on a combination of state assessment data, student growth scores, absenteeism rates, and graduation rate. It is one of 367 schools in the nation and one of just nine


